There was filed with the Register of Wills to-day a preliminary accounting of the personal estate of Colonel John Mc-Kee, the eccentric colored man, who left the bulk of his fortune to Archbishop Ryan and Joseph P. McCullen, in trust, for the establishment of a training school, isnoring a daughter and other relatives.

The account shows that the amount of funds in the hands of the executives is \$11.548.29, of which \$50,594.29 represents the decedent's personal effects, the balance being made up of dividends and other sources of revenues. These funds, with the exception of \$613.52, have been distributed, and the accounting will come up in the Orghan's Court for adjudication in a few weeks.

According to the accounting, the daughter, Abbie A. F. Synhax, received \$29,200 and Horry McKee Meaton, a grandson \$25,600, in lieu of a contest which had been instituted by Miss Synhax grainst the admission of the will to probate.
